## **L&GNSW COMPLIANCE**

#### INTELLIGENCE LED RISK BASED COMPLIANCE

- ✓ We review our regulatory approach using data, intelligence and research to understand existing or emerging issues in both the liquor and gaming industries. This information informs and shapes our key regulatory priorities.

# **Overview – NSW Gaming Industry**

#### **INDUSTRY**

- 71,400 AGM's in 1,130 Clubs average RTP 91% (minimum 85% over the life of the machine)
- 1,200 MTGM's (Roulette, Blackjack) in 80 Clubs
  - 15% CAP per Club
  - \$100 max bet >97%RTP
  - **S. 61 GMA** Clubs allowed, no provision for Hotels
- 23,700 AGM's in 1,320 Hotels
- 1,500 AGM's and MTGM's in Star Casino
- Barangaroo No EGM's

#### **CMS**

- All machines connected Clubs 2001, Hotels 2002.
- GMIC (Gaming Machine Interface Card) controls connection
  - S. 133 GMA requirement of Hotels/Clubs to ensure connection 100 units
- Exception if in legal storage approved by CMS

#### RESPONSIBLE GAMBLING

- ClubSafe, AHA, Betsafe
- s. 49 (3) GMA Requirement of Clubs and Hotels who operate AGM's to have a selfexclusion scheme — 100 units

- Aristocrat (51.0% of machines)
- ▲ SG Gaming (17.7% of machines)
- ▲ Ainsworth (12.0% of machines)
- ✓ IGT (9.6% of machines)
- ▲ Konami (4.8% of machines)
- ▲ Aruze (2.9% of machines)
- Other smaller manufacturers (2.0%)

### **DEFINITION OF AN APPROVED GAMING MACHINE**

#### A GAMING MACHINE DECLARED UNDER S. 64 GMA 2001:

- any subsidiary equipment approved by the Authority for use in connection with the gaming machine, and
- any component of the gaming machine (other than a component prescribed by the regulations as not being part of the gaming machine), and
- ▲ any specially approved gaming machine within the meaning of section 141 (state-wide link systems).









## **GAMING MACHINE IDENTIFICATION**

# WHEN AUDITING GAMING MACHINES, THERE ARE TWO WAYS TO IDENTIFY THEM:

- ▲ EASY COMPLIANCE PLATE SERIAL NUMBER
  - Located on the side of an approved GM
- ▲ HARD GAMING MACHINE IDENTIFICATION NUMBER (GMID)
  - In audit mode, this is found in the setup menu.
  - Issued by CMS, and is critical to connection with CMS. <u>More on CMS later...</u>
- ▲ LEGISLATIVE REQUIREMENTS FOR COMPLIANCE PLATES
  - s. 121 GMA 2001 specific details surrounding the design and make of compliance plates



### **TYPES OF LICENCES**

# S. 83 GMA2001 – DECLARES THE TYPES OF GAMING LICENSES AND THE AUTHORITY THEY CONFER:

#### **▲ DEALERS LICENCE - Manufacturer**

- Manufacture and assemble gaming machines
- Sell approved gaming machines
- Service, repair and maintain machines

#### ■ SELLERS LICENCE

- As an employee of a dealer negotiate sale of AGM's on behalf
- To otherwise sell, as principal or agent, AGM's

#### **▲ TECHNICIANS LICENCE**

- To service, repair and maintain AGM's
- Must conduct business from approved premises

#### cl. 74 GMR 2019 - Change in state of affairs of gaming licensee

# POSSESSION OF APPROVED GAMING MACHINE BY UNAUTHORISED PERSON

- ▲ A person who is in possession of an approved gaming machine is guilty of an offence unless the person:
  - Holder of gaming related licence; or
  - Hotel or club with gaming machine entitlements; or
  - Business involving transportation or storage of goods; or
  - L&GNSW Inspector; or
  - Lawful seizure under authority of search warrant;

s. 70 GMA 2001

#note – Landlords may have possession if a gaming-related licensee has been evicted for a maximum period of 21 days

s. 70 (3) GMA

### POSSESSION OF UNAPPROVED GM's

#### s. 69 GMA – Possession of GM that is not approved

- ▲ A person must not possess, supply, sell or install a gaming machine unless it is an approved gaming machine
  - 100 penalty units

# **QUICKCHANGE**

- An internet based authorisations system.
- Where authorised persons apply for installation, disposal and configuration changes to gaming machines.
- Online format can accommodate immediate approval (where appropriate).
- More efficient as applicants can apply for multiple transactions at once and amend before final approval stage







# **Centralised Monitoring System (CMS)**

#### Described under Part 9 of the GMA2001 (s. 132 – 140A)

- ▲ All electronic gaming machines must be connected to the CMS.
- ✓ It is the responsibility of the venue to ensure connection to CMS.
- ▲ Monitor for faults and CMS is operated by Data Monitoring Services (DMS) a branch of Maxgaming Pty Ltd who hold an exclusive monitoring licence.
- ensure integrity of gaming machine operations.
- Calculate venue's gaming machine tax.
- Controls State Wide Link Jackpots.
- ✓ It is an offence to interfere with the operation of CMS.

# **Gaming Machine Tax**

#### Tax rates for clubs

The rate for profits of more than \$250,000 are set out below.

Quarterly profit from gaming machines	Rate
Over \$250,000 up to \$450,000	28.05%
Over \$450,000 up to \$1.25 million	18.05%
Over \$1.25 million up to \$2.5 million	22.55%
Over \$2.5 million up to \$5 million	24.55%
Over \$5 million	26.55%

#### Clubgrants

Under the Clubgrants scheme

- if your annual tax is over \$250,000, it includes a 0.4 per cent contribution
- if your annual profit from gaming machines is more than \$1 million, you must pay an additional 1.85 per cent of the amount over \$1 million, unless you contribute the same amount to community projects.

#### Tax rates for hotels

The rate for profits of more than \$50,000 are set out below.

Quarterly profit from gaming machines	Tax rate
Over \$50,000 up to \$250,000	33%
Over \$250,000 up to \$1.25 million	36%
Over \$1.25 million	50%

Gaming machine tax is paid on the metered profits of gaming machines in clubs and hotels within NSW. The tax is

- •based on information collected by the <u>Centralised</u> <u>Monitoring System (CMS)</u>.
- •administered by <u>Liquor and Gaming NSW</u>
- •<u>calculated at varying rates</u> according to the profits generated
- •collected by Revenue NSW on behalf of Liquor and Gaming NSW and in accordance with the <u>Gaming Machine Tax Act</u> 2001 No 72.

## **CMS - GAMING MACHINES & MONEY LAUNDERING**

- May be characterised by:
  - Large Cash In amount
  - Low turnover
  - Win amounts do not correlate to payout figure
  - Collect >\$5,000 to require cheque payment
  - Does not breach threshold transactions (>\$10,000 Cash)
  - Should be reported as Suspicious Activity- AUSTRAC
- ✓ For example, a person inserts \$1000 worth of \$50 notes into a gaming machine, plays \$10, then cashes out \$990 ticket.

### **GAMING MACHINE SHUTDOWN PERIOD**

#### **ALL VENUES**

- General 6 Hour Shutdown for each venue 4am 10am
- Applications can be made to vary shutdown hours, including to have a 3 hour shutdown (6am – 9am).
- ▲ Applications can also be made to be deemed an early-opener (6am open eg Sydney Markets, near Wharfs etc).
- Can be identified by CMS meter readings.
- **s. 39 41 GMA** 100 penalty units

# RESPONSIBLE CONDUCT OF GAMBLING Competency Cards

- ▲ Hotelier must hold a recognised RCG certification
  - cl. 57(2) GMR 2019
- Secretary of a club must hold a recognised RCG certification
  - cl. 57(3) GMR 2019
- ▲ Hotel or club must not employ a person whose duties involve approved gaming machines unless they hold a recognised RCG certification

cl. 57(4) GMR 2019

### THE COMPETENCY CARD

- Competency Cards expire after 5 years
- SMS/email notification of upcoming expiry
- Register online to undertake refresher course
- 30 min Refresher course costs \$35
- Refresher course must to undertaken within 28 days or a full RCG course must be undertaken
- A person must not, without reasonable excuse, fail to produce it to a police officer or inspector
- A person may now also present a digital RSA Competency Card





### INDUCEMENTS TO GAMBLE

- Offence to offer or supply:
  - free or discounted liquor
  - free credits for the purposes of gambling.
    - cl. 47 GMR 2019
- ✓ Offence to provide cash advances for purposes of gambling
  - s. 108 *LIQUOR ACT 2007*
- ✓ Offence to misrepresent credit EFTPOS transactions through tills
  - s. 109 *LIQUOR ACT 2007*

# **LOCATION OF GAMING MACHINES**

- ✓ If on the premises of a Hotel or Club a gaming machine is deemed:
  - To be in a located in a manner that would attract the attention of members of the public who are outside the venue
  - Or, is contrary to the public interest
- ▲ The Secretary may provide notice in writing to the venue requiring the movement or screening of gaming machines.
  - Standard process would dictate identifying the issue with venue
  - Allowing venue to proactively address the issue
  - If not addressed, issue direction
- Offence for failing to comply with direction

s. 44A *GMA 2001* 

## OTHER GAMING ROOM LEGISLATION

✓ If a Hotel has greater than 10 AGM's, no more than 5 can be in the general bar area.

s. 68 GMA 2001

▲ A Hotel must have a dedicated Gaming Room if more than 10 AGM's. The requirements that this room must meet are outlined at:

cl. 8 GMR 2019

#### cl. 8 GMR2019

- **→** >10 AGM's
- ✓ Must be physically separated from the general bar area by floor to ceiling wall. At least bottom half must be opaque. That is, must be in it's own actual room.
- Patrons must not be required to walk through the gaming room to enter or leave the hotel.
- Entry to the GM room must be free of charge.
- ▲ AGM's must not be placed so they are visible from outside the hotel.
- Must be supervised at all times...
- ▲ Must have access to bar, toilets etc. They can be located in other areas of the Hotel.
- ✓ If the GM room can be directly accessed from the street, each doorway that provides access to the rest of the Hotel must be clearly marked.

### PAYMENT OF GAMING MACHINE PRIZES

#### s75A GMA 2010— General requirement to award or pay prizes

- ▲ A hotelier or registered club must award or pay a prize to a player who is entitled to the prize on request by the prizewinner.
  - Monetary prizes have to be paid within 48 hours of the request,
  - If a prize is not awarded or paid immediately the hotelier or registered club, must give the prize winner a written acknowledgment of the entitlement to the prize

# CHEQUES AND CASH DISPENSING FACILITIES

- ▲ A hotelier or registered club must pay prize money by a crossed cheque or electronic funds transfer if the prize exceeds \$5000. cl. 26(1) GMR 2019
- ✓ If the total prize exceeds \$5000, a hotelier or registered club must pay the whole prize by a crossed cheque or electronic funds transfer if the prize winner requests so.

cl. 26(2) GMR 2019

▲ Cash dispensing facilities (e.g. ATM or EFTPOS terminal) not to be located in part of club or hotel where AGM's are located cl. 28 GMR 2019

## **GAMING MACHINE ADVERTISING**

Offence to publish or cause to be published gaming machine advertising.

s. 43(1) *GMA 2001* 

■ Separate offence to enter into a contract or arrangement for the publication of gaming machine advertising.

s. 43(3) GMA 2001

- ✓ For the purposes of this section "gaming machine advertising" means any form of advertising that gives publicity to, or otherwise promotes or is intended to promote:
  - (a) the playing of approved gaming machines in a hotel or on the premises of a club, or
  - (b) the supply, sale or manufacture of an approved gaming machine,

# **GAMING MACHINE SIGNS**

- ✓ Offence to display or cause to be displayed any gambling-related sign:
  - (a) anywhere outside or in the vicinity of the hotel or the premises of the club, or
  - (b) anywhere inside the hotel or the premises of the club so that it can be seen from outside the hotel or the premises of the club.

#### s. 44(1) *GMA 2001*

Separate offence to enter into a contract or arrangement for the publication of gamblingrelated sign.

#### s. 44(3) GMA 2001

- ✓ For the purposes of this section "gambling-related sign" means any sign (whether consisting of words, symbols, pictures or any other thing)--
  - (a) that draws attention to, or can reasonably be taken to draw attention to, the availability of approved gaming machines in a hotel or on the premises of a club, or
  - (b) that uses a term or expression frequently associated with gambling, or
  - (c) that relates to a gambling franchise or gambling business,

Does not include TAB signage

All venues must display the new designs, and remove old designs, from 23 January 2022.





## CHEATING AND UNLAWFUL INTERFERENCE

## s. 80 (1) (3) (4) GMA – Cheating and unlawful interference Guilty of an offence if:

- Person in possession of a device intended to be used with normal operation of an AGM (light-wands, magnets).
- Does anything calculated to interfere with the normal operation of an AGM.
- ✓ Inserts anything other than coin, note or member card into an AGM to obtain money dishonestly.
- ▲ Through fraudulent representation, scheme, practice or use of an AGM, obtains for someone any benefit (can include falsifying tickets to claim monies).



# 'Serious, systemic': Pokies venue hit with record \$100k penalty



A NSW pokies venue has been hit with a record \$100,000 fine and its former secretary banned from the industry for life after a large-scale investigation found management had offered alcohol and cash advances to customers to encourage them to keep gambling.

The breaches uncovered at the Illawarra Steelers District Rugby Club, known as Steelers, were "serious and systemic" and put venue consumers at risk of harm by unlawfully incentivising continued gambling, the Independent Liquor and Gaming Authority (ILGA) found.



Display gambling sign outside/in vicinity of hotel/club.

In March 2018, L&GNSW Inspectors identified two signs, sufficiently similar to the artwork of the 'Dragon Cash' gaming machine, visible from outside the venue.

As a result two penalty notices issued- \$2200.

The NSW Independent Liquor & Gaming Authority has imposed hefty fines and bans on two gaming machine licence holders for their roles in a gaming machine rebirthing racket.

#### **RECENT MAJOR INVESTIGATIONS:**


- ▲ Chipping Norton gaming machine seizure
  - Information received from manufacturer
  - "Destroyed" gaming machines. Re-birth by Technician and Seller
  - 2 machines seized with assistance of Hornsby RSL Club
  - 3 further machines unknown location
  - Interview with Technician onsite confirmed location
  - 3 further machines seized
  - Unauthorised premises with 222 gaming machines. Countless parts
  - Catalogue of all machines within venue
  - Seizure of 35 machines by L&GNSW
  - Action being taken against the licence of the Technician and Seller

# OPERATION OF GAMING MACHINES IN SHUTDOWN HOURS

A recent project by L&GNSW targeted the illegal operation of gaming machines at Hotels and Clubs during their shutdown hours. CMS data was used in capturing critical initial evidence for this project. **S. 39 to s. 42 of the** *GMA 2001* outlines the requirements for the mandatory shutting down of gaming machines.

If you have any investigations of this nature, we are able to provide the CMS data if necessary.




